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2. Executive summary

This report has been prepared for Dunedin City Council. The report has been designed to give a detailed understanding of recent trends in Dunedin's arts and culture sector.

Data goes to 2022 and is an update of an earlier report¹ published in 2020 that contained data to 2019. This update can help shed light on the experience of Dunedin's arts and culture sector during the Covid-19 pandemic. Due to limited data availability, the report's focus is on employment, GDP, and businesses.

2.1. Defining the arts

For consistency with central government, this report relies on a definition identified by Manatū Taonga – the Ministry of Culture and Heritage (MCH) in a 2020 report it commissioned². This definition expands on one used in an earlier 2015 report for MCH and Creative New Zealand³.

MCH's definition includes people employed within organisations in a range of arts and culture-related industries, as well as people with occupations identified as being creative. The full list of industries and occupations that feed into the definition are found in 'Appendix – sector definition'.

There are a number of subsectors within the broader definition of the arts and culture sector, including: performing arts, museum/library/archives, publishing, design, screen production and radio, and visual arts, crafts and photography. The report focuses on the overall arts and culture sector, but some outcomes related to employment and value added have been split into the subsectors where possible.

2.2. Data sources

Several data sources were used to model trends in Dunedin's arts and culture sector to 2022, including:

- Statistics New Zealand business demography, Census, and LEED taxation data.
- Manatū Taonga Ministry for Culture and Heritage (MCH), 2023, Impacts Report 2021/22.
- Benje Patterson's 2020 report on Dunedin's arts and culture sector, which drew heavily on Infometrics data, was used to establish pre-Covid baseline understandings to 2019.

2.3. Key findings

- Dunedin's arts and culture sector employment grew strongly up until Covid-19, peaking at 2,578 jobs in March 2020. There was a small decline in employment during the pandemic, with employment falling to 2,440 jobs in 2022.
- The arts and culture sector accounted for 3.7% of Dunedin's employment in 2022.
- The largest subsectors of employment were design, followed by museum/library/archives, screen production and radio, visual arts, performing arts, and publishing.
- Approximately 55% of employment was directly within the listed arts and culture subsectors, while the remainder were people with arts and culture occupations within other industries.
- Dunedin's arts and culture sector is estimated to have generated \$247 million of GDP in 2022. GDP recovered by 3.2%pa in 2022 from its pandemic low of \$239 million in 2021.
- GDP per fill job in Dunedin's arts and culture sector was \$101,110 in 2022, up from \$92,404 in 2019, and has grown at an average growth rate 3.0%pa over the past three years.

3. Employment

This section describes the jobs available within the arts and culture sector. The analysis considers changes in employment through time, relative to the rest of Dunedin's economy and nationally.


3.1. Employment levels and trends across the sector

Dunedin's arts and culture sector employment grew strongly up until Covid-19, peaking at 2,578 jobs in March 2020. There was a small decline in employment during the pandemic, with employment falling to 2,440 jobs in 2022. Arts and culture sector employment nationally eased off in the early stages of Covid-19 during 2021, but recovered strongly during 2022.

The arts and culture sector accounted for 3.9% of employment in Dunedin in early 2020, while by 2022 the sector accounted for 3.7% of employment. Dunedin's arts and culture sector's share of total employment is now similar to the sector's share of employment nationally, which sat at 3.7% in 2022.

Arts and culture employment trends were weaker than total employment trends in Dunedin recently.

3.2. Many people are self-employed

A large number of people in the arts and culture sector don't work for an organisation or business and are classified as being self-employed.

Previous analysis by Infometrics to 2019 showed 25% of arts and culture jobs were held by self-employed people, compared to a self-employment rate of 12% across Dunedin's total job market. This proportion would imply that over 600 people within the arts and culture sector were self-employed in 2022.

3.3. Employment in arts and culture subsectors

There are a number of subsectors within the broader definition of the arts and culture sector, including:

- Performing arts
- Museum/library/archives
- Publishing
- Design
- Screen production and radio
- Visual arts, crafts and photography.

The following table shows that the largest subsectors of arts and culture employment were design, followed by museum/library/archives.

Approximately 55% of employment in 2022 was directly within the listed arts and culture subsectors, while the remainder were people with arts and culture occupations within other industries.

The data shows that people directly employed within arts and culture subsectors were those who struggled the most during recent years, while people with arts and culture occupations employed in other industries fared better. This observation makes sense as Covid-19 restrictions prevented the public from directly experiencing many core arts and culture activities such as festivals, performances and live shows, as well as being able to visit museums, galleries, etc.





3.4. Occupations

This section examines the occupations of people employed within Dunedin's arts and culture sector. Occupational estimates are based on the relationship between industry and occupation observed in population censuses and should be used as indicative only as modelling draws on Census 2018 relationships.

The largest occupations are graphic designers, architects, advertising managers, and newspaper or periodical editors. Rounding out the top 10 are music teachers, photographers, painters, librarians, authors, and print journalists.

The following table provides an overview of all occupations in Dunedin's arts and culture sector that were estimated in 2022 to have at least 20 jobs. These occupations account for about two thirds of arts and culture sector employment.

4. Economic contribution

This section describes the economic contribution of the arts and culture sector. The analysis considers changes in GDP (value add) through time, relative to the rest of Dunedin's economy and nationally.

4.1. Value added (GDP) by the sector and trends


Dunedin's arts and culture sector is estimated to have generated \$247 million of GDP (value add) in 2022. GDP recovered by 3.2%pa during 2022 from its pandemic-induced low of \$239 million in 2021.

The recovery of economic activity within Dunedin's arts and culture sector during 2022 was below the sector's recovery nationally. Data modelled by Infometrics for MCH showed that the GDP of the arts and culture sector grew by 10.6%pa nationally in 2022.

The arts and culture sector accounted for 3.3% of Dunedin's GDP in 2022, down from a revised 3.4% in 2019. Dunedin's arts and culture sector's GDP share is below the sector's share nationally (3.6% of GDP).

Dunedin's arts and culture GDP has grown slower than total GDP in Dunedin over recent years.

4.2. Value added (GDP) per job in the arts and culture sector

This section presents GDP per filled job in the arts and culture sector. GDP per job is a proxy for labour productivity, with growth in the measure over time implying an increase in efficiency and competitiveness.

GDP per fill job in Dunedin's arts and culture sector was \$101,110 in 2022, up from \$92,404 in 2019, and has grown at an average rate of 3.0%pa over the past three years. By comparison, GDP per filled job across Dunedin's whole economy has grown by 1.8% over the past three years to reach \$112,516 in 2022.

4.3. Considering GDP across arts and culture subsectors

The following table shows that the subsector that accounts for the highest level of GDP is museum/library/archives, closely followed by design.

The subsector with the fastest rate of economic growth over the recent years has been screen production and radio (8.1%pa).

Approximately 63% of arts and culture GDP was directly within the listed arts and culture subsectors, while the remainder was generated by people with arts and culture occupations who work within other industries.

5. Businesses

This section describes the businesses in the arts and culture sector. Earlier analysis showed that 25% of people are self-employed, but that still leaves 75% employed within businesses (a definition which also includes other organisational structures).

5.1. Business numbers and trends across the sector

There were an estimated 623 businesses in the arts and creative sector in Dunedin in 2022. Businesses have risen from 573 in 2019, at an average growth rate of 2.8%pa. This growth was below the 4.7%pa growth rate nationally.

The arts and culture sector accounted for approximately 4.9% of businesses in Dunedin during 2022, just up from 4.8% in 2019. Dunedin's arts and culture sector's share of businesses is just below the sector's share of businesses nationally, which sat at 5.3% in 2022.

Arts and culture business numbers have grown faster than total businesses in Dunedin in recent years.

6. Appendix – sector definition

The definition of the arts and culture sector used in this report is based on a combination of industries and occupations. Industries used accord to the Australia New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC) system, while occupations used accord to the Australia New Zealand Standard Classification of Occupations (ANZSCO). The definition is aligned to how the sector was defined in a 2020 report to Manatū Taonga – the Ministry for Culture and Heritage⁴.
